


Navigating a Website Finding a Site



Today, Jane wants to visit her library's web site. To do that, she uses a search engine to search for it.


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
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In this example, Jane is using Google. First, Jane opens the search engine using her web browser.



Next, she types the name of her library into the search box. As she types, potential search results come up automatically. When Jane finishes typing, she hits the enter key on the keyboard to submit her search.






In the list of results, Jane's library is the first choice. Sometimes, Jane may need to scroll down the list of results to find what she is looking for. Once she finds the link she is looking for, she can click on it to go to the website. Go ahead and click on the link to the Seattle Public Library to get to the site.

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Great! Jane is now on her public library's website. Jane can use the same steps to find any website she is looking for. For example, her health care provider, her child's school, or the community newspaper.
